Official Town Meeting Minutes March 10, 1998 Town of Colebrook, New Hampshire

The Moderator, Philip Waystack, declared the 1998 Annual Town Meeting open at 6:00 p.m. Father Bellefeuille gave the opening prayer, followed by the people present reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

- Article 1 Officers were elected by ballot from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
- Article 2 To act upon all of the following articles contained in this warrant.

Moderator Phil Waystack stated that, since Article 3 was a ballot vote and the polls were still open, Article 3 would be passed over until after 7 p.m.

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to obtain interim financing for the Colebrook Wastewater Plant Upgrade and Industrial park Expansion from the State Revolving Fund (RSA 486:14) and raise and appropriate the sum of \$600,000 for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications, permit applications, land acquisitions and/or easements and for the initial construction of the Wastewater Treatment Facility Upgrade and Industrial park Expansion. Such sum shall be raised from participation in the State Revolving Loan Fund (RSA 486.14). Said loan will qualify the Town for Federal and State funds which shall be used to repay the principal amount of the loan and provide the primary funding for completion of the entire project. The loan amount shall not exceed \$600,000 under and in compliance with provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and the Town votes to authorize the Selectman to determine the rate of interest of the loan and expand such funds as become available from the Federal and State governments and pass any vote relating thereto. (Article to be by Ballot Vote, 2/3 vote needed for passage).

Ballot vote: Yes - 188 No - 24

Article 4 To be conducted by Ballot vote, "Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Article III Definitions as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Certificate of Occupancy (CO): A permit issued by the Planning Board following construction and prior to use. Please see the posted full text of this article.

Ballot vote: Yes - 271 No - 174

Article 5

To be conducted by Ballot vote, "Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment No. 2 to Article IV (Zoning Regulations) as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

6C: Certificate of Occupancy. After construction is completed but before the structure is occupied, a Certificate of Occupancy shall be issued following an inspection by a designee of the Planing Board. There will be no fee for a Certificate of Occupancy unless a floodplain inspection is required. Please see the posted full text of this article.

Ballot vote: Yes – 277

No - 169

Article 6

Motion made by George Gould and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of \$363,621.00 for General Government passed with a voice vote.

Due to the polls still being open for the election of officers and a ballot vote being requested for this article, it was passed over until the polls closed.

Article 7

A motion was made by Jules Kennett and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the amount of \$145,810.00 for the Police Department. Larry Stanton presented a written request with five Colebrook voters' signatures calling for a ballot vote on this article to the Moderator. After considerable discussion, David Chittum made a motion to amend the article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$148,810.00 for the Police Department. Michael Whitaker seconded the motion and a voice vote in the affirmative carried the amendment. The ballot vote on the amended article was as follows:

Ballot vote: Yes – 162

No - 56

Michael Sielicki made a motion to restrict reconsideration. Joy Haynes seconded the motion and it passed with a voice vote.

Article 8

A motion made by Steve Brooks and seconded by Jules Kennett to appropriate the amount of \$95,125.00 for Emergency Radio services, of which \$42,985.55 will be raised through taxation and the remainder to be offset by revenues raised from the participating towns passed with a voice vote.

Article 9

A motion was made by Jules Kennett and seconded by Steve Brooks to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of purchasing capital equipment for the Colebrook Dispatch Center and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 to be deposited

into this new Capital Reserve Fund and to authorize the use of \$9,500.00, the December 31, 1997, fund balance for this purpose. And to authorize the Board of Selectman as agents of this fund. This motion passed with a voice vote.

- Article 10 A motion made by Steve Brooks and seconded by George Gould to raise and appropriate the amount of \$10,250.00 for Outside Fires and Hydrant Services passed with a voice vote.
- Article 11 A motion made by George Gould and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be added to the existing Equipment Reserve Fund with the sum of \$15,000.00 to be used for the purchase of highway equipment and the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser passed with a voice vote.
- Article 12 A motion made by Jules Kennett and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of 254,940.00 for the maintenance and expenses of Highways and Streets for the ensuing year passed with a voice vote. Jules explained that the plans were to shim the East Colebrook Road and lay fabric near the Leonard Gould residence on the East Colebrook Road/Bear Rock Road.

The Moderator stated Article 13 would have to be passed over until the results of the ballot vote for Article 3 were in as it affected this article.

- Article 13 The moderator read Article 13 indicating that there was a misprint in the warrant and the article should read: To raise and appropriate \$809,549.00 for the Colebrook Water Works and the Colebrook Sewer Facilities: \$62,147.00 for the Water Department and \$747,402.00 for the Sewer Department. (Sewer Department budget includes \$600,000 from the State Revolving Loan Fund). He asked for a motion to amend the article as read. George Gould made a motion to amend the article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$809,549.00 for the Colebrook Water Works and Sewer Facilities. Jules Kennett seconded the motion and a voice vote in the affirmative carried the amendment. The amended article passed with a voice vote.
- Article 14 A motion made by George Gould and seconded by Jules Kennett to raise and appropriate \$4,900.00 for Welfare for the ensuing year passed with a voice vote.
- Article 15 A motion made by Jules Kennett and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of \$83,129.00 for the maintenance and expenses of the **Transfer Station** for the ensuing year passed with a voice vote.

- Article 16 A motion made by Steve Brooks and seconded by George Gould to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,548.00 for the operating cost of the Recycling Program passed with a voice vote.
- Article 17 A motion made by George Gould and seconded by Jules Kennett to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Parks and Patriotic Services passed with a voice vote.
- Article 18 A motion was made by Jules Kennett and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purpose of road and drainage repairs to Willey Road. The road shall be built to State of New Hampshire, Class V road specifications. After discussion of what Class V road specifications were, Brent Lyons made a motion to amend this article as follows: Raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purpose of road and drainage repairs to Willey Road to specifications already negotiated between the Selectmen and the Willeys. Howard Henson seconded the amendment and the amendment passed with a voice vote. Voting on the amended motion was by standing count as follows:

Yes - 82 No - 78

- Article 19 A motion made by Steve Brooks and seconded by George Gould to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to support the Great North Woods Region Association in their efforts to promote the Great North Woods Region passed with a voice vote.
- Article 20 A motion was made by John Fothergill and seconded by Larry Rappaport to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) to create a Recreational Department and to hire a Recreation Director (Submitted by petition) John Fothergill spoke to the motion and after considerable discussion, it passed with a voice vote.
- Article 21 A motion was made by George Gould and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,690.00 for the following Agencies: UCVH (\$7,600); Ambulance District A-1 (\$12,740); UCV Mental Health (\$2,400); Vershire Center (\$1,000); North Country Council (\$1,950); Coos Community Action (\$2,100); UCVH Home Health (\$9,500); Big Brothers/Big Sisters (\$200); Animal Control (\$700) and Public Health Officer (\$500). The motion passed with a voice vote.
- Article 22 A motion was made by Carroll Jackson and seconded by Nancy Call to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,156.43 for the support of the Colebrook Public Library, \$66,192.00 of which to be raised through taxation and \$13,964.43 of which to come from other sources such as

Library balance on hand January 1, 1998, book sales, donations, trust funds, non-resident fees, other communities, over due fines, book resales, copying fees, etc., such funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Library Trustees. The motion passed with a voice vote.

- Article 23 A motion made by David Collins and seconded by Steve Brooks to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,196.75 for the operation and maintenance of the Colebrook Cemeteries, the sum of \$18,196.75 to be raised through taxation and \$15,000.00 to be raised from burials, cemetery trust funds and other Colebrook Cemetery revenues passed with a voice vote.
- Article 24 A motion made by David Collins and seconded by Jules Kennett to establish a Cemetery Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31-19a, for the improvement of the Colebrook Cemeteries, and designate the Cemetery Trustees as Agents to expend, and to authorize the Selectman to appropriate \$2,000.00 of said funds to be transferred from the December 31, 1998 general fund balance passed with a voice vote.
- Article 25 A motion was made by Marguerite Wiswell and seconded by Eugene Jannenga to see, (Part A), if the Town would vote in support of an inland alignment within the Town for the route of the pipeline; and (Part B) to see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate to be paid, in partial or full amount as may be necessary, for prosecution of a Federal court case seeking an inland route within the Town. (Submitted by petition) It was agreed by all present to allow Fred Martin, a non-resident, to speak to the motion. The voice vote for Part A was in the negative and Part B was passed over.
- Article 26 A motion made by George Gould and seconded by Carol Dinco to allow the Tax Collector to accept the pre-payment of taxes pursuant to RSA 80:1-a passed with a voice vote.
- Article 27 A motion made by Bud Hulse and seconded by Jules Kennett to accept, ratify and confirm the reports of Agents, Selectman, Auditors and all other Town officers passed with a voice vote.
- Article 28 To transact any other business that my legally come before this meeting:

David Collins made a recommendation that the Town Report be made clearer to understand.

Phil Waystack made a recommendation that the Selectmen consider either moving the poll closing time back or moving the meeting start time ahead to avoid confusion.

Jules Kennett, out-going Selectman, was given a round of applause for his term of office.

George Gould commended Donna Caron for the excellent job she did while acting as interim town manager. She was given a round of applause.

The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 10 p.m.

COLEBROOK POLICE REPORT

It is my privilege to prepare this annual report for the residents of the town of Colebrook. Instead of providing the community with a traditional, statistical discussion of the past, I would like to take this opportunity to discuss the future of the police department as it relates specifically to the town and generally to the region.

The coming year will be one of great transition for the police department as the town searches for and hires a new police chief. This process must be completed with the utmost consideration and care. A police chief is an integral part of the community fabric. The chief must have a strong law enforcement background and have the ability to foster community trust. The police chief must possess an ability to interact on a personal level with the residents of the town, the business community, town administrators, schools, and the young people of the community. The chief must also command respect, while providing leadership and guidance to the other members of the police department.

The town will also be hiring at least one full time and perhaps several part time police officers. Gone are the days when a police officer was easily recruited, provided a minimum of training, and sent to work on the street. The police officer of today is a law enforcement professional who now often enters his or her career with a minimum educational level of an associates degree, and increasingly a bachelors degree is required. They must be computer literate, have good oral and written communication skills, be in above average physical condition, qualify to carry firearms, competently testify in court, be able to maintain discipline and composure under excruciatingly stressful situations, have a willingness to confront difficult problems and be able to make competent decisions involving a great deal of discretion and common sense, often with little or no supervision available. They must also be compassionate, dependable, have impeccable integrity, be able to withstand an extensive background investigation, and may be required to pass physical and psychological testing.

I would like to take a moment to discuss a trend that has been growing nationwide which is the increase in juvenile crime. We are seeing juvenile violence in schools, physical and sexual assaults in the community, acts of random crime, drug and alcohol abuse, motor vehicle related injuries, fatalities and suicide. While this is a national problem, I must share with you that these problems also exist in the north country. Criminal behavior often starts during the teenage years and how that behavior is treated often determines whether the pattern will continue into adulthood. Programs such as DARE, CPAL and juvenile diversion have proven themselves in their effectiveness to offer alternatives to the youth of the community. I would encourage you to continue to support these programs to the fullest extent possible. Special programs however cannot provide the total answer. More and more the police are finding themselves arresting younger criminal offenders. I believe that at least part of the answer lies at home. How can we expect children to not abuse drugs and alcohol, when the role models they look up to use drugs or drink to excess?

How can we expect teenagers not to commit acts of violence, when they routinely observe acts of domestic violence behind the closed doors and within the "sanctuary" of their own home? I believe we can make a tremendous positive impact if only we live our lives in the same manner that we ask our children to live theirs.

An often overlooked but extremely important link in the town's emergency services network is the dedication and professionalism exhibited by the men and women of the Colebrook Dispatch Center. Dispatch personnel are responsible for receiving emergency calls for service from area residents and contract towns. They are responsible for assigning the correct emergency response, to include local police, fire and ambulance services as well as coordinating other assisting agencies. The dispatch center is open 24 hours a day to receive emergency calls.

The police department has identified several goals to work towards during the upcoming year. One of the objectives is to provide additional training for all members of the department to include on scene accident investigation, advanced report writing, evidence collection and preservation, criminal investigation techniques, domestic violence training and other in service training opportunities. We are also actively working to implement a records management system to organize and monitor accident and criminal investigations. This system will also include a dispatch incident reporting system to document and track calls for service.

This annual report would not be complete without acknowledging the other agencies we work with on a daily basis. This includes the New Hampshire State Police, New Hampshire Fish and Game, other local police agencies, area fire departments and emergency medical services, federal law enforcement agencies, and the list goes on. Nowhere else in the state is there this level of cooperation among such a diverse group of individuals, who all join together in time of crisis for the single purpose of improving the quality of life for those in need at any given time, at any place, under any circumstances.

And as we remember the past, and look toward the future, let us never forget the sacrifices of those who have walked before us.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT

With the ice storm damage and the road washouts April 1st we had our work cut out for us for the spring. We purchased a chipper and that made the brush clean-up much more efficient.

The Willey Rd. project was completed, there again the chipper made the job go so much faster. The road has been widened and ditched.

We applied for and received a \$5000.00 grant from NESEC (Northeast States Emergency Consortium) for a new culvert on Hughes Rd. at Beaver Brook. The culvert was installed and will hopefully alleviate some of the flooding problems that we have experienced in the past.

Late in the summer we worked on the river bank stabilization project behind Hilda Littles' house on the Mohawk River. The Town hauled all the materials for the \$65,000.00 project which was overseen by the USDA as it was also a grant funded job.

We are working on the engineering aspects of the sewer system upgrade and the industrial park. This will also be completed with grant money; \$2,237,000.00 Our sewer plant should be brought into compliance once this project is completed. This will eliminate the moratorium which is currently in effect that does not allow new connections onto our sewer system.

The crew also built a new paper shed at the transfer station that is pulling out an average of 2 ton of materials each week. This is a significant cost savings in hauling and tipping fees if it were to go to the landfill in Berlin.

I want to thank my crew for doing an excellent job throughout the year, whether plowing snow or grading roads, they work some long hard hours. I also wish to thank our Town Manager for all his help and guidance.

COLEBROOK RECREATION DEPARTMENT REPORT

In 1998, the first step in development of a recreation program was taken. In the first few months of the department we had tremendous support and a good number of participants. This fall our youth soccer league had 32 participants in the 4 - 6 grade league and 37 participants in the 1 - 3 grade league. This was the first year that Colebrook had a program for 1 - 3 graders. This shows great promise for the continuing development of soccer in Colebrook. The other fall programs included a sports club with 20 participants and a parent/child soccer program with 8 participants. The parent/child program is designed to give children ages 4 - 6 basic skills to help them develop to the future.

Our winter programs had great numbers with the youth basketball league having 32 participants in grades 4 - 6. Our sports clubs split into two age groups with the 1 - 4 grade group having a steady 20 participants and the 5 - 8 grade group with 12 participants.

I would like to thank all those individuals that helped with our programs. Volunteer coaches, officials, time keepers, scorers are the fabric which holds our programs together. We would like to thank all the young adults who helped with our programs this year. With individuals like this, our town's the future is in good hands.

Cooperation with the schools is also very important to the success of our programs both indoors and out. In the fall we use the soccer fields and in the winter we utilize the gym. Without school facilities many programs would go unrealized. The use of the PAVE, Inc. facility on Colby Street has been important to the success of the programs and their development.

Our department will look to add more programs for all ages as 1999 moves on. The development process is an important one to any recreation department. We will continue our search for grants from state, federal, and private agencies. As we try to secure grant funding we will add and develop programs to meet the need of the public.

I am always interested in what the public thinks of our department. I invite you to call or write me with your comments, good or bad, so that we may better address the problems that face the town.

Of this total, \$549.00 collected for dog licenses was turned over to the Department of Agriculture for animal population control. The full amount collected for vital statistics is turned over to the State of New Hampshire.

Please note that this total will differ from the Treasurer's report by the amount of \$26.00 due to two insufficient fund checks. One check in the amount of \$223 was returned to me in 1997; however, the funds were not available for redeposit until January 1998. The other check in the amount of \$251 was received in December 1998 and still has not been honored. I have been forced to issue an administrative complaint with the State of New Hampshire in the hopes they can collect the insufficient funds.

For the coming year, the Planning Board would like to work closely with the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and local citizens to further refine Colebrook's Master Plan and do what it can to help plan and further the Town's objectives.

However, just as dairy farming has declined as a local industry over the past 25 years, so now is logging as a resource becoming more scarce. Competition for outside industry and tourism is becoming more intense and this is a competition the town must win.

The Planning Board believes that it can help both in coordinating the laudable efforts of local groups, including service clubs, the Chamber of Commerce, boards, churches, the action committees resulting from the UCVH community conference, town government and concerned citizens, as well as provide several public forums for discussion. Together we can keep our local economy healthy and all of us happy and productive.

REPORT ON THE COLEBROOK CEMETERIES

Colebrook has within its boundaries four cemeteries of which the trustees are responsible for three. The fourth is the private Roman Catholic cemetery on South Main Street just north of the Shrine.

The Cemetery Trustees have the responsibility of being the general overseers of the care and maintenance of the three cemeteries. However, in as much as the bulk of the money raised for the maintenance comes from perpetual trusts, the trustees of the Trust Funds of Colebrook are charged by State law with the task of insuring that the trust money is used as the original donors expected it to be.

Village Cemetery:

The village Cemetery is located on U.S. Route 3 at the northern edge of the village. The bulk of the old cemeteries trust funds are dedicated to this cemetery.

Reed Cemetery:

The Reed Cemetery is located in East Colebrook at the junction of the Forbes and Reed Roads. With one exception the rules that apply to the burials in the Village Cemetery apply to those of the Reed Cemetery. The exception is that, due to the limited space available for future burials, only those persons with either a strong family connection to the cemetery or own their lots, may be buried in that cemetery.

Titus Hill Cemetery:

This cemetery is located on Titus Hill Road, east of the village. Since there are no maps associated with this cemetery and no records exist of where the old graves are located this cemetery, for all practical purposes, is closed to future burials.

St. Brendan's Cemetery:

This is a private cemetery under the control of St. Brendan's Catholic Church in Colebrook, With the exception that the town annually provides a sum of money to assist in its maintenance we exercise no jurisdiction over its operation. All trust funds that were previously held by the Trustees pertaining to persons buried in this cemetery where turned over (with State approval) to the St. Brendan Trustees in the early 1980's.

Cemetery Trust Funds

There are five different types of trust funds relating to the village cemeteries: perpetual care, cleaning of tombstones, flowers, trees and shrubs, and general maintenance.

NOTE: It should be stressed here that the Colebrook Trustees of the Trust funds are not bound to accept bequeaths from wills or otherwise perform task which they feel are not in the best interest of the Town. (e.g. further flower funds.) The Trustees may reject such bequeaths. Consequently, should lawyers or persons drawing up wills call for advice, it is strongly urged that the Trustees advise the person plainly that any bequests against Trustees policy will not be accepted.

Perpetual Care: This is by far the largest number of trust funds held by the Trustees of the Trust Funds. They can be divided into three types:

- a. RESTRICTED: the oldest and largest number of trust funds. These are set up so that the interest was used only for the maintenance of a specified lot.
- b. NON-RESTRICTED: in the early 1980's the wording of the perpetual care trust funds was changed to allow the excess interest accumulated from each new trust to be used for the care of the cemetery as a whole.

c. GENERAL TRUSTS: starting in 1986, by a vote of the town's people at the Annual Town Meeting, it was decided to do away with specific trusts. Perpetual care funds are now transferred to a general cemetery trust fund and except for the year that the money was received, the identity of the trust is no longer kept separate. We do, however, keep a name card on file of these trusts for reference purposes.

Cleaning of Stones: There are three trusts that contain within their instructions wording that call for occasional cleaning of the tombstones. These instructions are to be honored as long as adequate funds are available over and above the general care and maintenance of the lots. No further trusts of this nature will be accepted, as the Cemetery Trustee's have initiated a cleaning and reclamation program for the complete cemetery.

Flower Funds: Originally there were twenty-four (24) lots for which flower funds had been established. These called for flowers to be placed on the lots each Memorial Day. These requests have been honored as long as funds were available to maintain the lots and purchase the flowers. Only nine (9) remain with sufficient funds. Annually (just before Memorial Day) the Trustees of the Trust Funds will contact one of the local flower shops and contract the placement of the flowers on the respective lots. No further trusts of this nature will be accepted.

(All lot locations are based on Nancy Dodge's register of cemetery plots and are all located in the Village Cemetery)

Trees and Shrubs: This fund was established by Elizabeth and Nellie Young to beautify the Village Cemetery. It can be used for the purchase of trees and shrubs, perennials, etc. little or nothing of the account had been used over the years, and as a result it has grown to considerable size. Presently, approximately \$500 is withdrawn each year to trim the hedges and shrubs.

General Maintenance: Frank Leonard left money for the general care and maintenance of the Village Cemetery. The interest of this fund has been used primarily to paint the wrought iron fence.

Tibbett's Family Trust: These funds are to be used to create and maintain the Tibbett's Memorial Park, and such other programs that will add to the beauty of the cemetery. The expenditure of these funds to be determined annually by the Trustees of the Trust funds in conjunction with the Cemetery Trustees.

New Cemetery Trusts: The purchase price of a new lot includes both the costs of the lot and the perpetual care. It is paid to the Treasurer of the Cemetery Trustees, who in turn pay it over to the Trustees of the Trust Funds.

COLEBROOK CEMETERY TRUSTEES REPORT

The Colebrook Cemetery Trustees and Sexton Roland Martin wish to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of Colebrook for their assistance and understanding in keeping our Cemetery in such beautiful condition, and a very special thanks to the Colebrook Garden club of the planters of flowers at the entrance of the cemetery and for the beautiful floral display in the area of the old tomb, they add much to the beauty of the cemetery. To David Collins for the hours spent in setting up the financial program and seeing that the cemetery policies and regulations have been carried out. To Leighton (Sonny) Cree for pruning and caring for the hedgerow at the Reed Cemetery over the past years, a project now adopted as part of the Colebrook Cemeteries beautification fund.

To often people are inclined to resent what they term "restrictions on my rights and privileges". Since the adoption of our policies, rules and regulations we have received many compliments and high praise on the condition of our cemeteries and the friendly and helpful services provided by our Sexton Roland Martin and his helpers Richard Grassette and Louis Roy.

Over the past year the State and Town Highway Departments replaced sections of granite curbing along Route U.S. 3, closing off 4 entry ways that have been grassed over because of disuse, better controlling the water runoff and erosion of the entrances.

Roland and his crew have developed programs to clean and wash the headstones, to lift, level and straightening headstones and footnotes, and to fill in sunken graves as time permits.

The Tibbett's Memorial Park has been laid out for cremations and several lots have been sold, thanks to the efforts of Bud Hulse, Also a wooden cross has been erected in the rear of the Memorial Park to be used for the "Easter Sunrise Programs".

A section of the cemetery has been cleared, and leveled to be laid out in the spring as single burial plots. This area is at the north side of the cemetery directly east of the Tibbett's Memorial Park.

Granite memorial name markers have been placed at the front of the Titus Hill and the Reed Cemeteries and the entrance of the Village cemetery has been cleaned and repaired.

Projects that the Trustees have discussed for future improvements are:

- 1. Paving the remaining entranceways up to the hedge line.
- 2. Rebuilding the existing road system.
- 3. Replacing some of the damaged hedges in both the Village and Reed cemeteries.
- 4. Placement of a new fence along route 3, this being a very costly project it will be spread out over a period of years so as not to greatly increase the yearly working budget.

The summer readers played New Hampshire Trivia and learned about New Hampshire wildlife. Judy Pancoast kicked off the reading program during the July book sale with her lively music and songs. The Sunshine Sisters presented New Hampshire history in humor.

The meeting room of the library continued to be a busy place. New Hampshire Employment met twice a month. Family Services held a parenting program once a month. The "Up with People" group enjoyed scrapbook and stamp classes provided by locals during their stay.

The windows in the basement of the old library were replaced in the hopes that the future may bring new usable space.

As always patrons have been very generous in giving both material and monetary support. The library gladly accepts videos, books on tape, magazine and books.

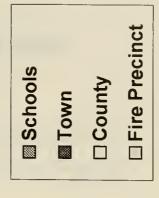

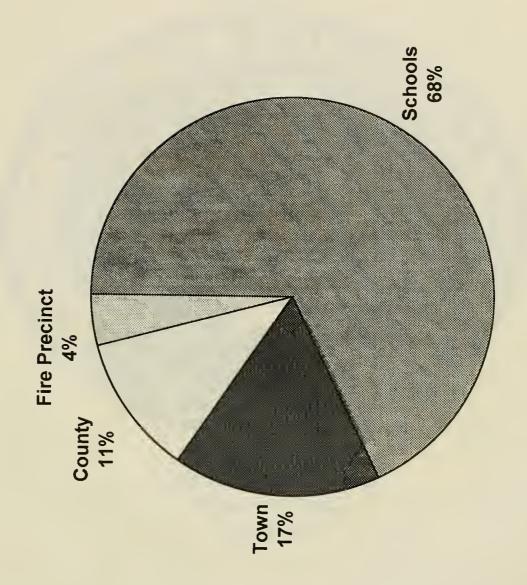

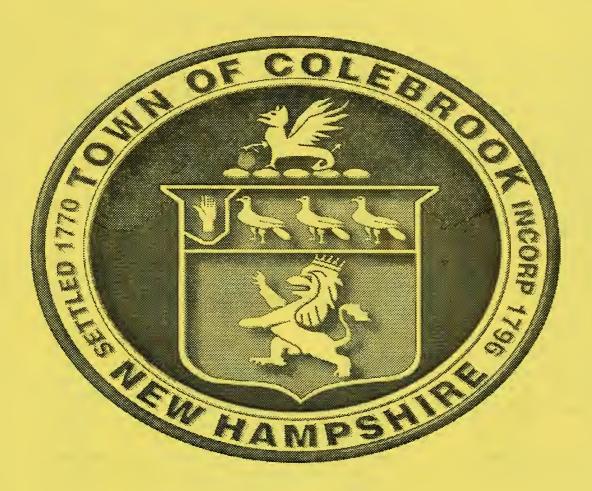

TRANSMITTAL AND COMMENTARY LETTER

Board of Selectmen Town of Colebrook Colebrook, New Hampshire 03576

In Planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Colebrook, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1997. We considered the Town's internal control structure to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance of the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we became aware of the following conditions that should be corrected in order to strengthen internal controls and operating efficiency. This letter does not affect our report dated June 25, 1998, on the financial statements of the Town of Colebrook, New Hampshire.

Our following remarks are being made in the hope that they will improve existing procedures and are in no way a criticism of Town personnel.

1. Bank Reconciliations

The bank reconciliations prepared by the Treasurer were not done with a month end cut-off date.

Recommendation

The general ledger is closed monthly and cash is balanced with the Treasurer at that date. To facilitate this process the Treasurer should use the same cut-off date as the general ledger.

2. Billing of Miscellaneous Town Charges

During the period covered by our audit miscellaneous Town billing was billed and collected by the same individual.

Recommendation

To enhance internal controls, the collection function should be performed by a different individual than the person who generates the bill.

3. Tax Collector's Records

The information on the "Collector's Trial Balance" from the computer did not agree with the source documentation. The amount billed should agree with the warrants signed by the Selectmen. There should be a signed abatement for every abatement input into the computer. Cash collections per the computer should agree with taxes remitted to the Treasurer.

Recommendation

The Tax Collector should reconcile the warrants and abatements to the computer and the source documents. A reconciliation should also be performed between the general ledger and the "Collector's Trial Balance" on a periodic basis (preferably monthly).

4. Water & Sewer Department Insurance Expense

In 1997 most of the insurance for all Town departments was paid by the general fund.

The water and sewer departments should be self-supporting and should pay their prorata share of the insurance expense. The insurance company should be able to provide the Town with a breakdown of liability and workers compensation insurance attributable to the water and sewer departments. Health insurance expense can be allocated based on a percent of hours worked for each department.

5. Tax Deeded Property

In 1996, to avoid tax deeding numerous properties, the Town entered into agreements with two taxpayers. These agreements allowed for payment against back taxes over an extended period in which the Town was required to execute a tax deed. These properties are still included in the blotter and are still being assessed taxes under the name of the 'Town of Colebrook."

Recommendation

Because the Town adopted RSA 80:80, the Selectmen can dispose of tax deeded property in some manner other than by public auction or advertised sealed bids "as justice may require". However, the Town should complete the tax deeding process first and it is recommended by the State that all agreements with taxpayers be registered with the County. Once the deeding process is complete the properties should be removed from the blotter and not included in the taxable valuation of the Town. Any payments received by the Town after tax deed are considered proceeds from sale of Town property not collections of property tax.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town for their assistance during the course of our audit.
